

OVERVIEW INTEGRATED NORTH SHORE TRANSPORTATION PLANNING PROJECT (INSTPP)


Transportation constraints and road congestion on the North Shore continue to impact our quality of life and the livability of our communities. The urgent need to address congestion prompted a collaborative, inter-agency forum to be established.

In January 2018, a steering committee made up of elected representatives was formed to lead the Integrated North Shore Planning Project (INSTPP). Alongside the Committee, a staff working group made up of representatives from all levels of government on the North Shore, TransLink and the Vancouver Fraser Port Authority was tasked to understand the access and mobility challenges, and explore possible actions.

This collaborative approach to transportation planning created a unique opportunity for all partner agencies to produce unified recommendations to improve how people and goods move around the North Shore and across the Burrard Inlet.

Through this process and extensive transportation analysis, five key access and mobility challenges were identified.



The North Shore is prone to transportation challenges because of: its constrained road network, the prevalence of single-family residential neighbourhoods that require reliance on cars, the lack of affordable housing to support a local workforce, and capacity limitations imposed by two bridges that provide access to the rest of the region. Addressing these challenges will require changes in how and when we travel, and how future growth should be accommodated on the North Shore.

On September 13, key findings from the INSTPP project will be presented to municipal Councils, setting the stage for future actions to help improve how we move on the North Shore. At the same time, the INSTPP report will also be made available online to the public.
